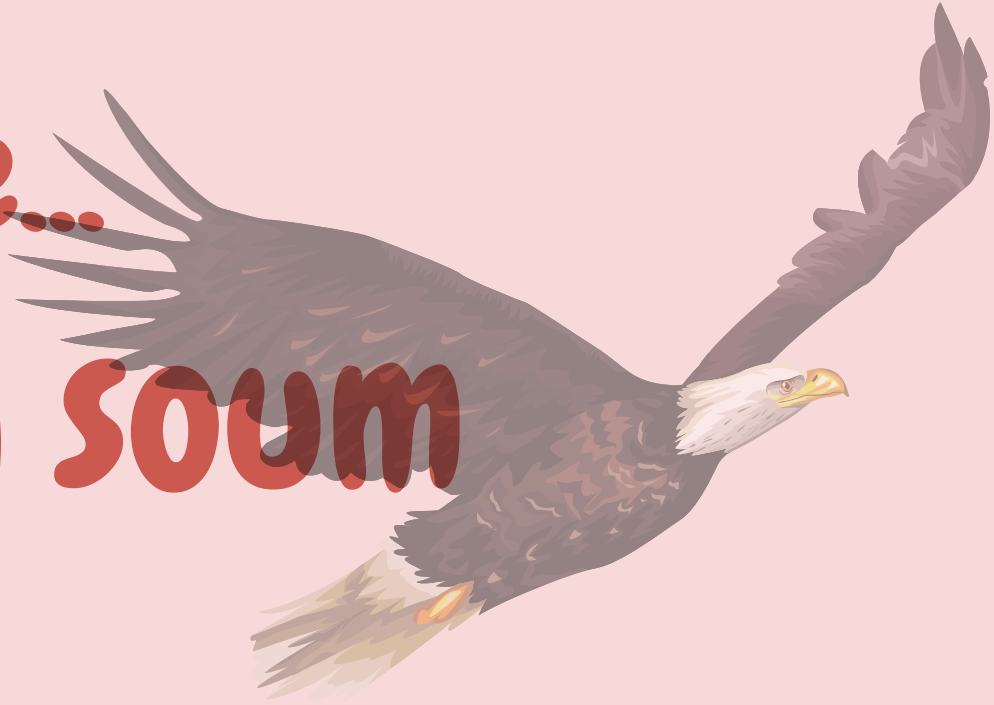


February Pitai'kisom Sounds like... b tai gy soum

Three Thousand: Inuk artist Assinajaq plunges us into a sublime imaginary universe that recasts the present, past and future of her people in a radiant new light. 14 min
Sigwan: The touching story of a young girl who is comforted and counselled by the animals of the forest. Written and directed by filmmaker Alanis Obomsawin. 12 min
Wasateg: A short story about dreams, courage, identity, creation and embarking our elders. Wasateg showcases Phyllis Grant's signature style of bold lines, bright colours, and simple movements. 52 min

nipawistamdoowin (We Will Stand Up): A profound narrative encompassing the filmmaker's own adoption, the stark history of colonialism on the Prairies, and a vision of a future where Indigenous children can live safely on their homelands. 52 min

Reskins, Tricksters and Puggy Stew: This documentary features Drew Hayden Taylor, and hilariously overturns the notion of the "stoic Indian" and shines a light on an overlooked element of Indigenous culture: humor and its healing powers. 54 min

Forgotten Warriors: This documentary introduces us to thousands of Indigenous Canadians who enlisted and fought alongside their countrymen and women during World War II, even though they could not be conscripted. 31 min
