Our students and staff collaborate on different ways that we can be engaged and active citizens in our community, and we continue to seek ways to connect with community agencies and organizations to enhance student opportunities for learning.

#### **CHALLENGES TO ADDRESS**

An identified challenge for our school is parental involvement. We also have noted that the parental involvement in completing the Assurance Survey is low. As a school staff, we continue to look for and reflect upon different opportunities to engage the broader parent community. We are also looking to gather survey data to seek feedback from parents on effective communication from the school.

#### **Evaluation**

We are very pleased with high results in the quality of education at Dr. Plaxton as our staff has put much time and energy into professional learning and creating high quality learning opportunities for students, along with working within the new Alberta curriculum.

We've continue to provide professional learning in the area of foundational literacy and numeracy learning for teachers and continue to provide collaboration opportunities with the resources. We continue to focus on instruction within a culture of thinking where students are supported to think critically, creatively and collaboratively within their classrooms.

This school year we will be focused on fine tuning our numeracy instructional practices and will be using our response to intervention documents to support all students in literacy and numeracy. We will also be beginning conversations around executive functioning / executive skills and how we support students with lagging skills in literacy and numeracy.

We are pleased to see that our results are positive, and that our students, teachers and parents feel that our community is one of a place where everyone is respected, cared for and safe while at school. Since opening, our school has approached this domain through the conceptual framework of having, loving, being and health (Konu & Rimpela, 2002). Through this lens we encourage and continue to build connections with each other, be intentional in our creation of a positive and safe school climate, and consistently work to resolve conflict through respectful and reflective restorative practices and through shared decision making.

#### **Evaluation**

This is the first year that we have received data in this area and we are pleased with the results of the survey data. Our teaching staff and administration continue to approach student learning support through the response to intervention frameworks for literacy and numeracy, and we are beginning the process of creating the same structure for social-emotional learning and regulation. Our student support team, consisting of a Student Support Worker, teams with teaching staff and administration to provide opportunities for students to seek support not related to school work. There is also continued universal and small-group supports for students in many areas such as conflict resolution between peers and friendship building.

#### **Evaluation**

We are concerned that there continues to be a discrepancy between what teachers and parents see as opportunities for parental involvement. Our school community continues to offer many opportunities to families to be a part of the school community through events and activities throughout the year. Parents have also been encouraged to participate in classroom volunteering, when teachers seek out help for a variety of learning opportunities and experiences. Survey results show that there is dissatisfaction with parental involvement in decisions about the school. We continue to openly advertise our school council dates and offer learning opportunities for parents to attend to increase attendance.

We will be requesting further feedback from parents in this area to see where improvements are required.

#### **Evaluation**

We have very strong programming with a variety of options in our school. We have a Fine Arts program where students are able to engage in music, art and dramatic activities and performances both in and out of class time. We also have a Makerspace where students participate in opportunities to enhance learning and curricular connection through Virtual Reality, 3D printing, building, coding and science experiments. We have connected with city and business partnership who have provided classroom presentations connected to subject areas. We've also provided extra-curricular opportunities for volleyball and basketball. An area of concern listed from the survey was the lack of opportunities for students to learn another language and participate in art. We will try to seek more information in these areas.
