
Awakaasiiki'som! Deer Moon: September

Important change in language for Land

Acknowledgements

Since time immemorial this has been the land of the Blackfoot people. The Métis, who's families originated from the Red River Settlement (Manitoba), have had documented history in Southern Alberta since the early 1800's. Historically, the Métis Nation of Alberta was divided into "Regions," with Region 3 covering Southern Alberta. The MNA has since updated their terminology from "Regions" to "Districts," and Southern Alberta is now referred to as Foothills District #1. However, several Métis communities across Alberta, including eight settlements, remain unrepresented by the Métis Nation of Alberta. To avoid unnecessary political complications, it is sufficient to state that Southern Alberta is recognized as part of the Métis homeland or to acknowledge the Métis people residing in Lethbridge. It's important to be mindful of the language used in your land acknowledgment!

Faceless Dolls


Our division wide Orange Shirt Day will be on Friday, September 27th. Here are a few book ideas for your classroom! Some of them have read alouds!





























Some prompts for talking to students about Orange Shirt Day and Residential schools....
